Use of Pupil Premium Grant in 2015/16

De La Salle was allocated a Pupil Premium Grant of £199,607.00 in 2015/16.

The purpose of this grant is to close the disadvantage gap by addressing inequalities and raising the attainment of those students in low income families and service families.

Students eligible for Pupil Premium are:

- Free School Meal students (FSM) or students who have been eligible for them over the last six years. (FSM6)
- Looked After Children (LAC)
- Adopted children or those under special guardianship
- Military Service Children (children whose parents are currently serving in the armed forces.)

Allocation of funding 2015/16

The funding allocation is decided via a team of members of the Senior Leadership including the AHT in charge of Pupil Premium, the Head teacher and the governing body.
