Parental Update 28

This week and next have the feel of inconsistency and disruption with the bank holidays and strike action, as our normal rhythm and routine is broken. We are working hard with the students in school to maintain a sense of normality and focus upon their learning and schooling throughout this time.

The disruption, however, hasn't stopped the wide range of activities and experiences for our students, many of which centred around Earth week: Mindfulness Monday, Walk to School Wednesday, Litter Picking and Flick It Off Friday. Elsewhere, our Year 7s took part in 'Guess My Job' careers event, our Year 11s came in yesterday for exam revision / preparation sessions and Year 9 have been taking part in a workshop led by the brilliant Anthony Walker Foundation.

Whole School Focus: Running GCSE Exams

In the whole school focus I try to cover a wide range of topics about school life to help parents get a deeper understanding of what goes on in school, and this week I wanted to lift the curtain on what goes in to managing GCSEs for 240 students.

Of course, our primary focus is on preparing our Year 11 students for those final few weeks before the GCSEs start. Every department has had detailed plans in place for what will be taught, to whom, by whom and when since before Christmas. As I say, however, I wanted to give you a bit of an insight into the actual process of running these important exams.

The main GCSE exam window opens on Monday 15th May. Running these exams is a mammoth task, led by our exams officer, Mrs Roughley and her team of invigilators. As well as the main large venue in the Sports Hall, we also need to operate a range of smaller venues for students with a range of additional needs including those who need extra time, require readers, require scribes or any other adaptations.

The level of planning and organisation required to not only make this happen, but for it to happen with the level of security and adherence to the very strict guidelines, is incredible. With every venue needing to be secure, have all the appropriate signage, seating arrangements and distances etc. It is also very demanding on staff time, requiring large numbers of exam invigilators. We are always on the lookout for new invigilators.

The exams will run most days from 15th May through to the end of June, with every day's completed exam papers needing to be sorted, bundled and dispatched to the appropriate marker or exam board venue. Then we look ahead to the summer results and keep our fingers crossed!

Anthony Walker Foundation

We have worked very hard last year and this year on addressing wider key issues such as harmful and discriminatory language and behaviour, whether this is racism, homophobia, transphobia, sexism or similar behaviour. As part of this work, we have been supported by the Anthony Walker Foundation to pilot their school accreditation award for inclusion.

This work has been really important to us, as a school, not as some 'woke' or 'lefty' nonsense as some of the worst of the national press would have you believe but because it sits at the heart of two of our Lasallian Values: respect for all persons and inclusive community. More importantly than that, it also means a lot to our students and their experiences in school – they want to feel safe, supported, accepted and an inclusive environment achieves that for them.

What's My Job?

When standing in the rain waiting for a late 752 bus I have often asked this question, but it is also the theme of a recent careers session our Year 7 students took part in. This involved several volunteers from a wide range of occupations coming in to school. They arrived in their 'civvies' and students were able to question each of them to try to establish their occupations. The point being to remove any unintended bias or prejudice that might exist in who the students think might fulfil these roles.

Amongst our volunteers were a care provider, police officer, council worker, surveyor and digital marketing manager. The students really enjoyed the event and the challenging of working out who did what. One student made a lovely comment saying to the care provider "I think you in the care uniform have the best job of all because you really do care for people."

Year 11 Study Leave

We have had several parents ask about Year 11 study leave. The idea of wholesale 'study leave' ended a few years ago but our current practice is for students to attend fully until half term, after which revision sessions will be arranged to link in with upcoming exams taking place in the spaces where completed exam subjects took place. The Year 11 team are currently planning these and information will be sent out soon.
