Parental Update 29

A very truncated week this week but we have worked hard to make the most of the 3 full days that we have had with the students. It is also encouraging to see the students' attendance remain strong despite the interruptions, so thank you for your support in making that happen. Looking ahead, it is another shortened week, owing to the bank holiday and we have our first parents' evening under the new blended system. It will be interesting to see how this works out. We also have a Year 9 retreat and the window opens for Year 9 assessments.

Whole School Focus: Careers Provision

It was interesting to read some comments in the recent Big Ask which seemed to suggest that some parents assumed our only work in careers was the weekly newsletter that I attach to this briefing.

Obviously, this isn't the case, as many of you will know, I believe very strongly in the power of highquality careers as a vehicle for educating, inspiring and supporting students to see beyond the local and obvious, and to build aspiration.

Our Careers Programme is part of our Touching Hearts Curriculum and runs across every year group as a spiral curriculum, building upon what has gone before and preparing the students for what lies ahead. Each Year has its own individual aim:

- Year 7: To begin to explore the range of careers pathways that exist
- Year 8: To develop the students' understanding of the world of work
- Year 9: To consider their own skills and attributes and how these link to subject areas and career pathways
- Year 10: To gain employability skills and explore the world of work including Labour Market Information and post-16 career planning
- Year 11: To ensure students are ready to choose their post-16 courses and are fully aware of all the options available to them at the end of Year 11 and beyond.

In addition to the structured careers curriculum, all of our students are involved in a range of Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG) throughout each academic year (See our <u>Provider Access Policy</u> – pp 4-7).

Our students also have full access to all our CEIAG Resources for example:

- Assemblies from Aspirational Speakers, Career Connect and other external providers.
- Careers Connect Drop-ins (lunchtimes)
- Careers Connect Portal and other on-line websites
- Advice from your subject teachers subject career notice boards
- Designated careers base in the careers room Prospectuses and Future Careers resources available

I hope this helps reassure parents about the importance we place on careers education and the broad range of experiences we provide to our students.

You can perform miracles by touching the hearts of those entrusted to your care.

1719 Society and Team Reims

As you may be aware, we recently held our interviews for next year's 1719 Society. It would not be an understatement to say that we were overwhelmed by the volume and quality of applications. Previous years we would expect around 20 applications of varying quality, this year we had over 40, all of extremely high quality.

In the interviews we identified the 18 students who will form the 1719 Society but, owing to the strength and quality of many of the other applicants, we were keen to tap into the skills and attributes these students had shown, hence the creation of a second student leader group which we are calling Team Reims, named after the home city of our Founder. Far from being a 1719-lite, Team Reims will work very differently and will focus upon connecting and supporting some of our most marginalised students.

This week we received the very sad news that one of our former colleagues, Jenny McCourt, had passed away after a short illness. Though I never knew Jenny, I know she was much loved and respected in the school by staff and students. Our thoughts and prayers are with her family.

Extra-Curricular Activities

The Big Ask again raised questions around what extra-curricular activities the school is running for students. So I thought it would be useful to share the <u>extra-curricular timetable</u> for this term. Of course, these are just the regular sessions and there are many more activities that take place as one-offs and as special events.

Reading Interventions

As I have mentioned previously, reading has been a priority for us this year. We have invested considerable time and effort in assessing all of our students reading abilities. Where students have shown issues with their reading, we have introduced a range of levels of intervention and support, which I have also previously shared with you.

This week, we have been re-assessing the reading ages of those undergoing intervention and the impact has been extremely significant with some improvements of 4 or 5 years in reading age in just 5 months.

Your help in encouraging and supporting the importance of reading beyond school will help build upon these strong foundations.

Year 10 Mocks and Year 9 Assessments

Next month, Year 10 will be doing their mock exams, these are dovetailed to the main GCSEs to allow the students access to the large formal exam venues. The timetable for these will be shared very shortly.

Year 9 assessments, like all of our key stage 3 assessments, take place in class across a 2week window. These windows have been in the calendar for some time to allow students to prepare and revise but students have also been issued with blank timetables to record the times of each subject's planned assessments, to help with the final parts of their revision during the window.
