
How to revise at De La Salle

The following information is designed help you organise your time, resources and topics to allow you to effectively revise.

Spacing out your revision and revisiting information using the strategies outlined will help you to retain this information in your long term memory.

Following the cycle opposite will also help you structure your revision and know if the information has stayed in your long term memory.



How to revise at DLS – Art & Design AQA specification inclusive of Art, Graphics, 3D and Photography

How would I revise for art, graphics, photography or 3D?

Subjects studied under the Art and Design specification should lead to diverse, independent and creative outcomes and so there is no set way to 'revise' when it comes to art and design based subjects.

The most effective way to be ready for the Non-examined assessment in Component 2 and to feel confident and successful in your work is to practise, experiment, refine and develop your ideas to lead to personal explorations.

Learning, teaching and assessment are all focused around having a secure understanding of the assessment objectives (AOs). Being clear on what the AOs are and what they mean will ensure that you know the creative process which will help to realise your intentions to the best of your ability.

Suggested active revision techniques

Set up a small space at home with art materials so that you can develop your work when you can.

Attend after school or additional sessions when available.

Explore free digital editing packages and Apps which may help you to experiment and develop ideas further.

Discuss your ideas with anyone who will listen! Talking it through often helps you to see things more clearly.

Keep going back to the AOs, can you see that you are working through this creative process?

How to use the resources and websites

- Use the knowledge organisers (see attached) to build your knowledge of keywords, topic vocabulary and how to answer exam questions. Do this regularly, little and often will build your long-term memory.
- 2. Use **SMART** revise to practise recall. **Advance** section allows pupils targeted grade 6 and above to look at the advanced exam style questions. **Quiz section** allows pupils to test their understanding of the whole qualification or unit by unit. **Terms** section allows you to use the pre made flash cards to help understand keywords.
- 3. GCSE Knowledge Retriever book (white A5 guide) and GCSE Knowledge Organiser (Blue A5 guide). Use these guide together to help you memorise and retrieve important information. Use the 'How to use this book' on page 2 of the Knowledge Retriever book to help you follow the 7 essential steps. These books were given to year 11 pupils at the start of year 10, these were purchased by the department.
- 4. Purchase the 'Clear Revise OCR GCSE Computer Science J277' guide which will be available on parent mail within the next 2 weeks.
- 5. A range of revision techniques should be used including *flash cards, revision mats, one pagers, knowledge organisers, revision clocks, drawing diagrams with simple labels.* Do what works best for you.
- 6. Attend **intervention sessions** on a Tuesday 3.00pm 4.00pm.

Tips to Learning Lines

- Read the lines aloud. By speaking the lines you will hear them and they are more likely to stick.
- Ask a friend to help you. Friends can correct you on any mistakes you make, give you the cue lines and go back over any weak areas.
- There are several apps which can help with learning lines. Line Learner you record all the lines including those of other characters and then listen to them leaving silent pauses to speak your own lines. With Rehearsal Pro you can upload a script and watch it scrolling by as you record your lines to listen to.

How to break down an exam question

CUE- The first thing you should do when reading the question

C- Circle the command word U-Underline the key words

E- Extend words that have more than one element

There will be a bank of information and resources on Edulink and the classwork engineering folder to support them in their studies, this will Includes the topic sheets (specification checklist) terminology sheets and practice exam questions.

How to structure your time

Strategy 1: Use the checklist for the topics to cover for the exam. Use a Red, green and orange highlighter to assess your confidence on each topic. This is in the classwork book and on teams.

Red = Needs more work/ unsure

Orange = Faily confident but need to recap

Green = Confident

Choose one Red topic and plan a 30-minute revision session to focus on it.

In that 30-minute session spend 20 minutes actively revising. At the end of that 30-minute session answer some questions and mark these to see if you get them right.





How to revise at DLS – English

How to structure your time

1. RAG rate (GREEN = GOOD, AMBER = NEEDS WORK, RED = NOT GOOD) your current ability for each statement on the knowledge statements provided on the school website. Then make use of the links to online platforms to help you develop your ability on the areas you have rated as red or amber.

The sites you visit will give you the information you need to turn the red and amber areas to green and will usually give you an online quiz too so you can put your newly developed knowledge to the test.

Make sure you re-visit the sites to ensure that the new knowledge you have developed is strengthened.

For red topics, revisit the online platforms two weeks later and try the quizzes again. For the amber topics, revisit the online platforms a week later to make sure you have embedded the knowledge in your long term memory.

Revisit the sites as often as you need.

2. Using your knowledge organiser, identify the key words or core information that you do not know.

Use the look / cover / write /check method to help make this part of your long term memory.

You could create a flash card with the key word, definition and an image to help you remember it, or you could create a mnemonic to help you remember how to spell it. Make a set of quiz questions to see if these words / core information has embedded in your long term memory and ask a family member or friend to quiz you on these words.

Do this regularly – two to three times per week for only 20 minutes at a time. Devoting an hour of your week to building your knowledge and skills will really pay off.

3. For your literature texts, make sure you have gathered key quotes for each set text – related to key themes, key characters or key phrases from poems. As well as memorizing key quotes, you will also need to be able to explore and analyse them without looking at notes.

Again, flash cards are a really good way of organising your revision and testing your knowledge.

Make it easy for yourself! Learn quotes that are versatile (can be used for different questions) and chop quotes right down to the key essential words for learning – you can always fill in the other details using your own words.

How to structure your time

Start now! This will help to reduce stress later.

Get organised. Organise your notes, make sure you haven't got anything missing and go through the revision guide and highlight the units you need to revise.

Make a realistic revision timetable that can be stuck to (time available will need to be balanced for the various subjects studied). Follow the guided revision provided by the department.

Productive short bursts of revision should be planned (max half hour at a time) and some relaxation time should be planned in between sessions – exercise will also really help!

Make sure you learn case studies. They are in a booklet in TEAMS. You will need to ensure you learn facts and figures to back these up

A range of revision techniques should be used including *flash cards, revision mats, one pagers, knowledge organisers, revision clocks, drawing diagrams with simple labels.* Do what works best for you.

Attend intervention sessions on a Tuesday lunchtime.

STRUCTURE OF THE GCSE GEOGRAPHY EXAM

The GCSE exam is made up of 3 components The breakdown and dates of the exams for the three modules are given below:

- Unit 1 Living with the Physical Environment 35% of GCSE 1hr 30 min exam
- Unit 2 Living with the Human Environment 35% of GCSE 1hr 30 min exam
- Unit 3 Geographical Applications 30% of GCSE 1hr 30 min exam (this includes some questions based on pre-released materials that will be made available 12 weeks before the Paper 3 exam).





- 6. If you are struggling with a particular topic, come to the drop-in session for year 11s on a Tuesday lunchtime in S3. Bring your revision with you so that a history teacher can give you some feedback.


How to revise at DLS – Maths

How to structure your time

Use the topic list sent out by your maths teacher of topics you are currently studying along with topics you covered last year.

Use the progress section of Mathswatch (see below) to help recap on these skills. The best way to keep on top is to do little and often, 15-20 minutes at a time multiple times a week helps keep on top of topics without having massive gaps in between.

Keep track of your progress with the tracker and try to master as many topics as possible. Revisit topics as often as needed.





How to revise at DLS – Music

Revision Top Tips

- Flash Cards: Due to the vast amount of terminology making flash cards with the key terms will be extremely beneficial.

What point would you like to make that answers the question?

2. Example

Where can you find the evidence for your point?

3. Justify

Explain your point. How does your point link to the question?

- Step 1: Ask why example 1is a good example.
- Step 2: Ask why example 2 is not a good example.
- Step 3: Give an alternative (but similar question) and allow independent practice on the question.

B: I do - We do - You do

Step 1: You model the perfect answer

Step 2: We work together to answer the next question.


Step 3: I the student work independently to complete the next question.



How to revise at DLS – Religious Education

How to structure your time

Using your module organiser, complete a key vocabulary assessment by writing definitions to match the key terms. For those key terms that you may have struggled with, create a flash card and ask to be tested on the key term each day until you get right.

Use online platforms such as Seneca Learning and Blooket to test your knowledge on key vocabulary – even if it is just for twenty minutes.

Once you are comfortable with the key terms in the topic, use your module organiser to create a revision clock. Each section of the clock should focus on the 8 topics in each module, with space left on the clock to note down some Sources of Wisdom and Authority (SOWA). When revising, focus on one particular "hour", test yourself on what you can remember, correct any misconceptions and move on to the next section.

Using your module organisers/revision clocks, highlight any Sources of Wisdom and Authority which could be used across a number of topics – For example, "Let there be light" from Genesis could be used in the Creation topic from paper 1a and also the Cosmological argument from paper 3a.

Finally – REST!

How to revise at DLS – Science

How to structure your time

Read the topics/learning objectives on the Personalised Learning Checklists and use a pink, orange and green highlighter to identify your level of confidence and understanding for each outcome. This will help you to prioritise your revision.

Choose one pink topic and plan a 30 minute revision session to focus on it.

In that 30 minute session spend 20 minutes actively revising. At the end of that 30 minute session answer some questions and mark these to see if you get them right.

If you did, re-highlight.

Leave pink topics for the shortest amount of time before revisiting them (e.g. next day).

Leave orange topics a bit longer before revisiting them (e.g. next week).

Leave green topics and those which you just find most interesting even longer before revisiting them (e.g. in a fortnight).

You mind find that by focusing on your pink areas first you feel out of your comfort zone. This is normal and the way to revise most effectively. The good news is it does get easier.




