Parental Update 16

The end of week 2 and also, thankfully, the end of the very cold weather. A big thank you to all the students, staff and parents who ensured that school was able to continue, and particularly to our wonderful site team who have been gritting for England!

This week, we had the Year 8 Parents' Evening (online), art workshops for Year 8, Drama workshops, Year 10 Scholars programme, our KS3 Reading Mentors were out at St Teresa's primary school, Tutor Trust science tuition took place for some Year 10 and 11 students and today we have 76 Year 11 students out on their Geography Fieldtrip. Meanwhile, next week we have our Year 9 ski trip going out, we wish them all the best on the slopes.

Whole School Focus – Values

Last week, I shared a reminder of our school mission – basically what we are trying to achieve as a Lasallian School. This was very much our own mission, designed by and for our school by staff, students, governors and parents.

Alongside this mission, runs our Core Lasallian Values (below). These are not just used in our school, but are shared across the Lasallian community around the world. These provide us with the 'how' for achieving our mission.

Our 5 Core Values are below:

FAITH: Faith in the Presence of God: The Lasallian school nurtures belief in the living presence of God in our world. Faith in the presence of God calls all students into a deeper awareness of their saving relationship with a caring and loving God and to see the world through the "eyes of faith". This core principle is reflected through this Lasallian expression of faith: **"Let us remember that we are in the Holy Presence of God."**

COMPASSION: Concern for the Poor and Social Justice: The Lasallian school calls its members to an awareness of the poor and victims of injustice and responds to their needs through programs of community service, advocacy, and justice education. This core principle is expressed through the Lasallian ideal: "Enter to Learn, Leave to Serve."

RESPECT: Respect for All Persons: The Lasallian school engages in a concerted effort to respect the dignity of all persons. Respect-filled relationships are at the heart of Lasallian education and are a key expression of the acknowledgement of each other's identity as children of God. This core principle is reflected through the Lasallian expression of faith: "Live Jesus in our hearts...Forever."

CHALLENGE: Quality Education: The Lasallian school provides an education that prepares students not only for college and career but also for life. This education advances the students' abilities to use their talents to critically examine the world in light of the message of the Gospels and to take greater responsibility for their own education. This core principle is expressed through the Lasallian ideal: "**Teaching Minds and Touching Hearts**."

BELONG: Inclusive Community: The Lasallian school is a united community where diversity is respected, where no one is left out, and where everyone finds a place. Individuals within the school

community recognise and accept another's strengths and limitations. This core principle is expressed through the Lasallian ideal: "**The Lasallian Family**."

Equipment Expectations

One of the biggest issues we find that slows up lessons and learning, is students not having the correct equipment for school. I know some schools have lengthy lists including dictionaries, highlighters etc. For us, we are trying to keep this simple and manageable. So, for every lesson, students should have:

- Black or blue pen (ideally a couple for when one runs out)
- Pencil
- Ruler
- Calculator
- Planner (year 7)

Can we ask parents to ensure that your child has these every day? Students can also purchase them for cash and at cost from Student Services.

Recent Snow – Learning Points

This week's cold weather and disruption has highlighted a couple of issues where we can try to do better and be clearer. Namely:
